Spire

A few weeks ago, on January 12, at 7:20 pm I was at home with my family when I felt the entire house shake. I learned soon after that an earthquake had occurred near Anza Borrego. I asked my 9-year-old shortly after (he had been in the backyard office at the time), what he thought of the earthquake, he replied with utter confusion, "What earthquake?"

You must understand it was impossible not to feel the rumbling of the walls and floors in our house, even for

those who are more oblivious than not. Soren wasn't denying the rumbling, he just assumed it was the exploding of rocks from the local quarry (our house shakes all the time). An earthquake was not what he expected.

The beginning of 2022 for many of us has not been as expected. Even though we have been through this before—the masks, the online gatherings, the canceling of much-anticipated events—most of us wanted to believe those were relics of the past. To have to go through another round of change is not only disappointing, it is also exhausting. If you are anything like me, you are tired. But the benefit to tiredness is the invitation from God to rest. The book of Hosea which we have been unpacking in worship this year is in its essence a book about God's scandalous and relentless love for us. I don't know about you, but it is far easier for me to rest when I am in the presence of someone I trust, of someone who loves me.

So may you be encouraged this day to know, it is okay if you are tired this season and its okay to be frustrated with the rumbling of the walls of your house. In your tiredness and frustration, though, I hope you don't tire of God. Instead, may you accept God's invitation to rest.

The Executive Committee meets when requested to discuss and deal with emergent concerns on behalf of the Session.

Session also approved the Service of the Lord's Supper dates and congregational meetings, and elected Em Cummins, Sue Skala, Gresham Bayne and Session Representative Katie Fulhorst as Presbytery Commissioners. Pastor Karla serves on the Presbytery Strategic Planning Committee and Real Estate Task Force.

The Session heard from Finance Chair C Gresham Bayne, who claimed "2021 was the best financial year in PLCPC history." The year closed with \$200,000 in surplus. Stewardship Chair Pam Werner noted that we are starting 2022 with 78% of the pledge goal received. The Session approved a \$1.48 million 2022 expense budget with a \$50,000 income deficit, trusting that God will abundantly provide as our members and community continue to engage in new ways.

The meeting concluded with prayers for our community, with special prayers for the families of Elder Wayne Smith, and Elder Hal Sadler, recently deceased.

Last month PLCPC hosted the PBS series "Eyes on the Prize" with Pastor Karla as the co-moderator. This month Episode 2 will be hosted by Christian Fellowship Congregational Church. All are invited to this continuing study and discussion of the Civil Rights Movement sponsored by Continuing The Conversation.

This episode tells the story of two cases where states' rights loyalists and federal authorities collide. The first case is the 1957 battle to integrate Little Rock's Central High School. The second case is James Meredith's 1962 challenge to segregation at the University of Mississippi. In both cases, a Southern governor squares off with a U.S. president, violence erupts, and integration is carried out.

"Eyes on the Prize" tells the definitive story of the civil rights era. The story is told from the point of view of the ordinary men and women involved. Their extraordinary actions launched a movement that changed the fabric of American life. The movement embodied a struggle whose reverberations continue to be felt today. The series is the most critically acclaimed documentary on the Civil Rights Movement in America.

2021 Annual Report

In addition to the new staff additions in the online ministry, we were also not immune to the "The Great Resignation" this pandemic has caused across all industries. While the transitions of our Associate Pastor. Children's Ministry staff, and Financial Secretary have not feel to be a part of this church family. been easy ones for the church, we have also had the opportunity to see God at work moving us in fresh and new ways with our young people and in congregational care. The staff were not the only ones in transition, we have also seen a turnover in many of our tried and true

lay ministers, and while it has been a challenge to let go of former expectations, this has also allowed new people to step in and serve in ways they hadn't before.

We are leaving 2021 in many ways stronger than when we entered it, this is most clear through the abundant giving which has occurred through the work of your hands. It is overwhelming to consider the faithfulness of this congregation in the face of uncertainty and the way God has provided in us and through us. At a recent leadership lunch, several of our elders and staff members described one of the greatest strengths of PLCPC being "flexibility." I chuckled as I am not sure that word has ever been used to describe a Presbyterian congregation, but it certainly does describe how God has been shaping us through this season. Director of Operations—Jolene Wade

The beginning of 2021 brought about some unexpected challenges that required us to take a deeper dive into our purpose as we re-evaluated our role and how we can impact our community any beyond. We experienced staffing changes that resulted in re:imagining of positions as well as some opportunities which assisted in keeping our finances in a positive light. Our existing relationship and association with Church West afforded valuable insight with regards to the Employer Retention Tax Credit (ERTC) and achieving forgiveness of the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan which we needed in response to the pandemic.

As we transitioned to having a new Staff Accountant position, we saved money and brought staff members much appreciated Direct Deposit services through the implementation of using a payroll service in lieu of processing payroll in-house.

Adapting to outdoor services, then hybrid services, with limited volunteer presence has highlighted how flexible and cooperative we are, strengthening our bonds as a staff and leadership team. We've had many opportunities to experience the ways God provides for all of our needs. We made much-needed improvements through the campus including the resurfacing the wooden elements of the front of the church and refurbishing the wooden plaza/ parlor gates, enlisting the Men at Work to complete various repair and maintenance projects (including new paint in the Bell Room), as well as improvements made to improve efficiency in the flower room. The addition of AC in the Chapel provides necessary airflow and cooling to one of our larger on-campus spaces.

As we interact with various vendors, members, visitors or guests, we have an opportunity to share the love of Jesus through a caring and helpful attitude, even if it's over the phone. Over the last year, we have grown, adapted, changed and improved our spaces and processes which has a direct impact on our community and beyond.

Online Ministry—Melissa Mullins

Our newly created Online Ministry team represents the Session responding to the Spirit's leading to commit to an online church community. This sustainable model included two new positions in 2021, Online Ministry Director and Digital Content Producer. The Online Ministry Committee has been fully committed to discerning the priorities and activity of the ministry. The personal opportunities to grow closer and foster connection for many people, who have felt varying degrees of isolation, has been monumental in deepening the faith of those whose lives have been touched.

The installation of new equipment in the Sanctuary for filming and live-streaming services, which provides postproduction efficiencies and new abilities for our services, brought about amazing opportunities to reach those who may have felt left behind because of the pandemic.

Hybrid and online options for meetings, worship services, small groups and discipleship opportunities provided excellent opportunities for the Church to thrive in a new and ever-changing world. The creation of the online ministry is also providing new volunteer opportunities and unique ways for people to serve no matter where they are geographically.

The community was strengthened and given hope during isolation with our in-person Drive-In services that took place in February and on Palm Sunday and outdoor Cafe services on the Turf every Sunday morning. Special in-person concerts including the return of Bryan Verhoye's Fall Concert provided hope and inspiration as we experienced music communally.

Children's music ministry met in person with strict Covid protocols from January to May to engage in art and drama classes. Children pre-recorded an Easter drama, participated in a new Summer Music and Drama Camp, and resumed in-person in September. They sang in worship in November, at the Christmas Concert and the Christmas Eve 4:00p.m. hybrid Family Service, where

they presented *The Wonder of Christmas* musical, our first service to be live-streamed.

It is difficult to effectively quantify the effect of music in worship and the degree to which it strengthens the church. Glimpses can be caught via tangible results, such as music donations, written notes of appreciation, emails, new member participation, comments

and emotional responses. We continue to receive frequent positive and heartfelt responses directed at all aspects of the music ministry that confirm the impact of each group and the overall ministry.

The return of the Christmas Concert, a beloved tradition that highlights the best of our music ministry and brought together multi-generational groups was a highlight which marked a new era as we presented the concert both in person and via livestream.

Worship services, musical events and the various music ministry groups help us to deal with grief, anxiety and isolation and be inspired and uplifted. By focusing on God, His love and the expression of His love, we grow as the body of Christ and change the world one person at a time.

Red Brick Preschool—Nicole Hage

The Red Brick Preschool continues to support the mission, vision and values of PLCPC. The last 12 months have been unprecedented yet the preschool continues to thrive providing compassionate and engaging care and learning for the children and families in our community. Despite all of the challenges of the pandemic, we adjusted, changed and successfully complied with the ever-changing rules and regulations governing schools in California.

We continue to teach the children valuable skills to prepare them for kindergarten while also teaching them about the love Jesus has for them through our monthly Chapel where the children are taught a bible story and song. Preschool families are invited to all of our Children's Ministry and family events, with many of them choosing to participate and engage with the church community.

Children's Ministry—Lemuel Blackett

The Children's Ministry experiences Jesus each day through the blessing of enthusiasm and openness of our kids to learn more about God's Word. During 2021, some of our children expressed it was their first time opening the bible and reading it for themselves. This is a true Jesus moment.

We continued to re:imagine as 2021 began. We were able to engage our children and families through distribution of Easter in a Box kits, which included a Lenten Adventure Guide and some Easter surprises. In April we returned to in-person Kids Worship with an average of 15 children each week. Our Bible Memory class also returned and celebrated 9 new graduates! The campus came alive this summer as we encouraged "All Aboard" for our Rocky Railway themed VBS program, which welcomed 200 children for the 5-day adventure. For our littlest members, we hosted Hang Time in the Park, an outdoor time for songs and silliness with our preschool—1st grade children and parents.

Each week, we strive to instill within our children that they matter. With an emphasis on teaching the children about having faith in God and remaining focused on their goals, we are building confidence in our youngest members. When we engage with the children and show them that they have a place in the church, we are strengthening the church community. If the parents see that their children are developing spiritually that is an incentive for them to keep coming back to PLCPC. As the children get older they will see the value of being a part of this community and hopefully they will take the baton and carry on the work of God's church.

Our community events over the last year provided hope to a community that really struggled during the pandemic. While many organizations and groups have yet to return, we have found ways to return in a safe way with events such as Hang Time in the Park, VBS, Trunk or Treat, Movie Night, Game Night, and Red Brick Christmas. Though we have restrictions in place PLCPC still showed that the church is present and willing to do what is necessary to share the hope of God in these tumultuous times.

Youth Ministry—Michael Lombrano

BRICK Youth experience Jesus through weekly gatherings and monthly events. In September, as RO Smith transitioned in to a new role, the Youth Ministry continued the established weekly gatherings and special events under new leadership. Throughout the year, the students learned about different books of the Bible and how to apply them to present day. By encouraging open communication and asking good questions, we've opened meaningful dialogues for the students who have experienced a great deal of loss, change and difficulties as a result of the pandemic.

We continue to grow the ministry by allowing students to share topics they are interested in at our small group gatherings on Monday and Thursday evenings which encourage greater retention and curiosity in their faith walks. Summer Camps to Rock-N-Water (high school) and Campus by the Sea (junior high) provided much needed "normalcy" by allowing an opportunity for students to be surrounded by their peers and grow together and individually in their faith in new and challenging environments. We also gathered for some much-needed fun at a Padres game, axe throwing and the return of the Unicorn Battle.

Our number one goal of the ministry is to facilitate student growth in their faith both at church and in their daily lives. The students are challenged to be the hands and feet of Jesus in their homes, schools, and communities outside of the church.

Adult Ministries—Gresham Bayne, MD; Evan Gratz; and Lynn Ziegenfuss

2021 was been a year like no other. But that doesn't mean that God wasn't completely at work in the lives of our adult ministries community. We've seen incredible growth and commitment from our men's, women's and senior focused ministries.

Our Adult Ministries provide authentic community through relationship as we share life together. Once groups returned in person, their sense of God increased. The broader options presented by online ministry and Zoom allowed for more access to new people, hesitant of the church. We noted that the power of the prayers of others was an integral way people experienced God throughout 2021.

Opportunities including Bible studies, the Rooted series, special classes like spiritual gifts, Debrief and quiet days were designed to engage participants in their own relationship with God while being with each other. One recurring theme this year was how much people enjoy learning from other's perspectives while in a study with others. Our Racial Justice ministry saw 16 participants travel to the deep south for a Civil Rights Pilgrimage, which many characterized as life changing. Other events including Continuing the Conversation and the Racial Justice Book Club opened much-needed dialogues which assisted in guiding many as we drew closer to God and each other resulting in a deepening of faith, especially when people were authentic and vulnerable. Another common theme noted by adult ministry participants was how safe they felt to discover, admitting what they didn't know or expressing doubt, which allowed them to learn and practice their faith. Vulnerability with one another is uniting.

Both Men's and Women's ministries hosted events meant to welcome in new people, to help them connect and find easy ways to engage (Prayers & Pints and Wine, Women & Word.) Family Camp created a connecting point for younger families. While people engaging in new classes challenged each other's faith which helps them lean into the community more fully. When our community is together it is strengthened as people learn of needs for prayer and other types of support. More unity will always make us stronger.

> The Men's Bible Study has been a weekly blessing through the discipline it provides me to read and study the bible. Participants learn from the bible readings and the scholarly articles shared, but also through the group interactions in the most surprising ways. Often provocative questions are asked which correspond with the weekly readings. They are the hard questions that many might find embarrassing to answer in public. One week the question was: "If Jesus walked into this room right now and asked you what you most regret in looking back on your life, what would you say?" One 91 year old, who almost never speaks out in the group, immediately blurted out: "I wish I had told my wife that I loved her more often."

Senior Adult Ministry—Elaine Burrell

Senior Adult Ministry provided a place for fellowship and belonging by re-opening senior luncheons outdoors in March, along with outings and opportunities to foster new friendships among senior adults. Our church was one of the first to re-open for in-person activities, and drew many new participants from the Point Loma area and beyond. Our Care Ministry Bereavement Support Group provided a much-needed in-person group for people grieving the loss of their loved one. Strong bonds were formed among group members, and participants were introduced to our church, some returning for the Blue Christmas service.

What would

you say?

Several seniors were introduced to our church due to the online ministry (Sunday services online). Through the relationships we built at our in-person events, many were inspired to check out our worship services, sometimes for the first time attending church after a long absence. Remaining open and accessible for senior adults (and others) elevated people's awareness of the unique and valuable role the Church has in our society.

Deacons—Cara Thome

The Deacons experienced Jesus this past year through service and support of the people in our community. We delivered flowers and sent cards to those who were ill or lost loved ones. We also were able to take meals to those in need. We helped with collections for programs including Mission Beyond by collecting more than 150 pounds of jarred peanut butter as well as other much-needed canned food products through the Lenten Food Drive. The annual Backpack and Bus Pass drive netted 60 backpacks and more than \$2000 in cash donations.

The Deacons helped to guide others into deeper faith through the launch and support of the new Coffee on the Porch program, which unites church attendees from the different services together for fellowship and discussion each Sunday morning. It has also allowed people to get a glimpse of various church ministries and meet those involved in these ministries.

By providing support and volunteers to the church community the Deacons strengthen the church through individual and collective interactions. Deacon volunteers helped to greet and welcome church attendees each Sunday. They serve as ushers at memorials and special events including concerts, and provided monetary support for the music ministry as well as new tablecloths for the Family Life Center.

We hope that the Deacons have helped to transform our world by being the hands and feet of our church, whether it is through something as simple as delivering flowers and checking on a church member or helping to plan and support receptions for special events and services.

Mission Beyond—Rita Solberg

2021 has been a year of re-opening challenges for all of our PLCPC Mission Partners. We are inspired by the fresh wisdom and resolve that they bring to those they serve. As our relationships develop with each one of them, we continue learning how to humbly show and share the love of Jesus in places scattered throughout the world.

Grant requests from mission partners exceeded our annual budget allocation. Through the Mission Awareness reserve account, we were able to disburse one-time funding for missions with special needs above their annual session budget allocation.

In addition we were able to extend the grace and compassion of this church community by responding to other emergency needs: Lebanon Port Disaster Relief, Madagascar Famine Relief, Haiti Earthquake Relief, Disaster Relief for December 2021 Midwest USA Tornadoes, and a grant for \$2,000 was provided to a family moving to independent living from Father Joe's Villages Shelter. We also collected Welcome Baskets for Afghan Refugees at our Alternative Giving Fair. And celebrated a mountain of toys that were collected to support the Military Outreach Ministries Toy Store where 47 young military families shopped for Christmas gifts, creating immeasurable memories.

At least four of our international mission partners in dangerous, traumatized areas of the world, have added trauma intervention and training to their ministries. One prays that God will use Afghan Christian communities in diaspora to impact the nation of Afghanistan in ways beyond our wildest dreams.


