


Dear Friends,

Helpful Resources for People with Dementia and their Care Partners

Alzheimer's San Diego has developed some new, free programs to assist people living at home with memory problems, who may need some extra support.

Weekly Phone Calls

VITALZ (Volunteers in Touch) is a program whereby specially trained volunteers will call those enrolled in the program every week. These phone calls can be purely social, but they can also provide reminders about things like upcoming appointments and food deliveries, or serve to identify a new need the person living with dementia may have.

Free Counseling

Being isolated at home during the pandemic can cause heightened stress, depression, anxiety, and grief, especially for individuals experiencing dementia and their care partners. To combat this, Alzheimer's San Diego is now offering free, short-term counseling. This program is designed specifically for people with dementia and their care partners who are not currently receiving any other counseling services.

How to Write a Biopoem

A bio poem is a poem that is written to describe a person, living or deceased. Think of someone close to you and give it a try. Here is a template you could use to write one.

(Line 1) First name
(Line 2) Three or four adjectives that describe the person
(Line 3) Important relationship (daughter of ..., mother of ..., etc)
(Line 4) Two or three things, people, or ideas that the person loved
(Line 5) Three favorite things
(Line 6) Three things to fear
(Line 7) Accomplishments (one or two)
(Line 8) Two or three things the person has given/made as gifts
(Line 9) Two or three things the person has seen happen or wanted to experience
(Line 10) Nickname

Vivian

Giving, kind and patient The daughter of Greek immigrants Always knitting, reading, and making things nicer Teaching, caring, and living true to her values

Never learned to swim Matriarch of a loving family Sweaters for every member Traveled the world but has yet to see the Grand Canyon
